
The School Board has been quite busy this past year with the hiring of a new teacher as well as a new part time position of Director of Development. Mr. Jim Holstege has been doing a great job filling this position. One of the highlights of what he has been doing is creating an extra newsletter in January that helped introduce some of the new families here at Eastside.

The Building Committee continues to watch over and maintain the school building. The Technology Committee was able to connect our internet with First Church to save both the church and the school some money as well as have more reliable internet at the school.

The Finance Committee continues to keep track of what we spend as well as the income to the school. The school is once again in good financial condition. We have set the operating fund drive this year with a goal of \$134,000 just like last year. We have yet to reach our goal but we are grateful for all of our contributors.

The Eastside Foundation has once again agreed to continue the \$1,000 credit per student to reduce the tuition costs. The parents really appreciate the help that the Foundation gives them to help keep tuition costs lower.

The Promoters group has again been a big contributor to the financial well being of the school by making banket, running the Stop and Shop craft show, and putting on another great auction. The Lord continues to bless Eastside Christian School. It is evident in the parents, children, teachers, staff, volunteers, an supporters that He has given. We continue to see growth not only in numbers but also the way we all come together as a community to help this school to thrive. We are very thankful to everyone here and those who are not that continue to allow us to use Eastside as a means of nurturing our covenant children to reflect the mind of Christ.





We are excited to roll out the Eastide logo and identity update! As you can see, our school has a new logo design which we also carried over into an updated look for the newsletter.

The updated logo is the result of careful thought and a bit of behind-the-scenes work. Betsy Boelema and myself started the logo and identity update project in the summer of 2017. There were a few problems with the old Eastside logo. The first major problem was that the

logo file was lost. Created over 20 years ago, the school no longer had an original logo file (although we found out later in the identity revision process that our printing company had a copy of the logo). But for the past seven years, anytime someone needed to use the logo, we would come up with something that looked "close enough" in matching fonts. Not an ideal way to preserve your school brand. The second problem was that the logo was over 20 years old and in need of an update. Marketing wisdom says to keep your logo current — with some saying it should be refreshed as often as every five years. But also balance that with the reality that schools often keep logos for much longer — especially older, established schools and universities who want to preserve a look that points to their long history. And typically, when schools do update, they don't full-on follow the trend of the day (for example — the current trend of minimalistic fonts) but stay closer to their original look.

With all that as background knowledge, we started the process with an open mind, experimenting with the visuals that would pertain to Eastside and the idea of a Christian school – an eagle (the school mascot), a wing, a flame. But nothing was



really grabbing us, so Jim Holstege formed a logo committee to address the matter – Steve Ophoff with his background in signage, and Betsy Boelema and myself with a background in marketing. Jim nicely rounded out the committee with his enthusiasm and ability to keep everything on track. If any of us on the committee had a vision of sweeping change to the logo, that did not happen. Through lengthy discussion we ended up with the idea of a modest revision to the current identity – improve the fonts and graphic, as well as update with our colors. The original logo created over 20 years ago included people figurines – a large and small – as a nod to our mission statement of "nurturing covenant children to reflect the mind of Christ." The adult and child graphic was intended to point to the covenant, which is the basis and reason for our school. Once we talked it over, the committee began to come to the conclusion that using an eagle, a wing, or really anything else could not compare to a graphic that pointed to the covenant as the basis and reason for our school. The original logo was not broken. Slightly outdated perhaps, but still a good product. Improving the fonts and graphic, as well as updating the logo with the Eastside colors could go a long way.

Did you know there is **Eastside Blue** and **Eastside Green?** It's the blue and green you've seen in the marketing materials for the last six years - specific CMYK color values to ensure consistency throughout the website, newsletters, and other materials.

Since updating the logo was somewhat out of our personal expertise, the committee decided to submit the project to DesignCrowd. DesignCrowd is a website that allows you to submit a request for a logo for a small fee. Designers from all around the world can choose to submit an idea for your project. In the end, if you like a certain logo, that designer gets the money. If you don't like any, you get your money refunded.

Using DesignCrowd was a nice way for the committee to be objective and speak freely about opinions. About 40 logo options were submitted by various designers for us to consider. We had given guidance on what we were looking for, including a little bit about

our school, our mascot, our school colors, and our desire to stay close to the original logo. Of the 40 options, many were immediately discounted – some were "stock" logos, or generic logos that the designer took and slapped "Eastside Christian School" on. Some were

curious and maybe a little comical – an eagle landing on a pencil is one that comes to mind. But in the end, one particularly caught our eye. The designer modernized the fonts and the people figurines from the old logo. We asked for a change to Eastside colors and the result was our new logo.

If it sounds like a lot of work for a just a small change, well, perhaps it was. That could be our Dutch Reformed heritage coming out taking ourselves seriously, having meetings and in-depth discussions, and then ending up with something not that different than what we originally started with. But the process forced us to think through what important truth the logo reflects about our school. As you can see in this newsletter, the new logo will be used to update all the school identity marketing pieces – the letterhead, website, etc – and phased in when appropriate if replacement cost is a factor. We are excited for this logo and identity refresh! And next fall, the Promoters will be rolling out Eastside apparel with our new logo, so that is something to look for!

Every year, the Eastside orchestra students have the opportunity to compose their own piece of music and present that music (performed by the orchestra) at the All-School Program. This year, the students wrote music based on this year's school theme, The Whole Armour of

Students wrote pieces with titles like "Shield of Faith", "Stormy Battle", "Enemy of the Night", and "Victory March". These short pieces were named after elements of armour and war, which symbolized our spiritual battle and spiritual victory over sin and the devil.

Our goal in doing these projects is to give the students a more complete understanding of music, music writing, and performance.

On the one hand, it is the job of a performing musician to look at a piece of music, and through the information written down by the composer (rhythm, dynamics, notes, key signature, tempo markings, articulations, context) try to figure out how to bring that music back to life. What was the composer imagining when the he wrote the piece? What bigger musical expression and story is hidden in the symbols written down on the piece of paper in front of him? This is a challenging and exciting process for a performer, and one that bring great joy to all when done successfully.

With the composition project, we put the students on the other side of this scenario. What are your musical ideas? How will you as the composer decide to represent your ideas on paper? What instructions most clearly represent what you are imagining, so that the performer can bring your music back to life? There are many decisions each composer has to make, and many corrections to the score that will be needed during this process. The students will discover the importance of writing clearly, understanding how notes relate to one another in chords, and why a composer might write an accent here, or a dynamic marking there. This is also a fun time to introduce the students to various sound effects that can enhance the music such as slides, harmonics, or various bowing techniques.

The expectation is that each student will work hard and take ownership of his/her own music; and they do! There is a great deal of extra work put into working out all these details, a lot of editing, and much anticipation about how each piece will perceived by the audience.

We believe that the act of composing and presenting a piece of music gives the students a very complete and well-rounded view of music; one that will lead them to a lifetime of enjoyment and understanding of God's wonderful gift of music.

# HATCHING CHICKS



Mrs. Anita Haak planned a science project that the entire school enjoyed. The 1st-3rd grade hatched chicken eggs in the first grade classroom. They began the project with 18 eggs, and 15 hatched after 21 days. At the beginning of the project, the students weighed the eggs, and then throughout the 21 days they candled them (held them up to light to see life inside), and turned them three times per day. The class even recruited Lena Griess' mom to turn the eggs on nights and weekends! The kids held the eggs the day before they hatched and got to hear chirping from inside the shell. It was an exciting Wednesday morning when the students arrived at school to find most of the chicks had hatched! They made observations about the eggs and later the chicks - the beginning weight of the egg vs. the weight closer to hatch time, the movement inside the eggs close to hatch time, and when the chicks hatched they noticed they have an eyelid that comes up from the bottom of the eye. Any students who had a permission note from their parents were allowed to take home some chicks. Five of the chicks found homes with Eastside families and the rest were given to a farm.
